Dear Parents/Carers,

Thank you for working with us as we continue to review arrangements at the end of the day. Our priority is the safety of the children and we will continue to review and make changes until it works well.

Thank you for working with us on this as I continue to receive emails from concerned residents concerning parking. Today, a car was parked across two garages and on Thursday there were two cars stopped in the middle of White Friar's Lane. There were three cars parked on double yellow lines on Beaumont Road. Parents waiting by the back gate continue to lean on parked cars and stand in private driveways. Please remember that White Friar's Lane is a private road and cars should not turn left down the lane towards the back gate of the school.

You may have noticed this week that we had a traffic warden in attendance on Wednesday afternoon and PC Musgrove, came along to support us on Thursday afternoon. We are trying our best to ensure everyone's safety and are very appreciative of your efforts to follow our directions when you come to pick up at the end of the day; Please remember that any measures we put in place are there to keep everyone safe. We are a city centre school and parking has always been and will also be difficult but parking ten minutes away and walking to the school would be the safer option for everyone.

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Our Catholic Life



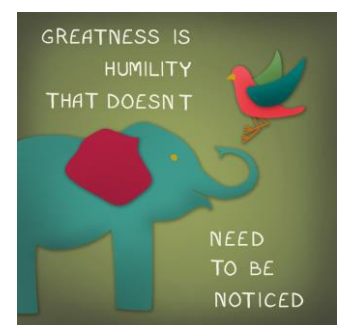

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Reading with Austen



Children in Key Stage 1 had a zoom visit with Austen from Plymouth Library. Austen read Meerkat Mail which the children are exploring in English. He also read some other animal stories. The children loved listening to the stories and all joined in to answer the questions he was asking.



Today we were excited to welcome Luke Pollard MP to Holy Cross. He spent a wonderful couple of hours visiting our school, accompanied by a small group of our newly elected School MPs. After the tour, when Luke had met and spoke with all the classes, he was interviewed by our MPS and asked some really tricky questions!

This is a snapshot of the discussion that took place - responses are paraphrased!

Daria - What is your role?

I am a member of Parliament, elected to represent the people of Plymouth and to change things for the better. Plymouth is a wonderful place to live and to go to school but there are some things that we can do to make Plymouth even better and that's my job.

Sam - Where do you work? Do you visit the Houses of Parliament in London?

I work in two places; I work in Plymouth and I work in London. In London I work in an office right next to the Houses of Parliament but I prefer my Plymouth office. The London office is cold and we have floods! I live in Plymouth so I like to work in Plymouth.

Joy - How did you become an MP?

I was elected by the people. There are lots of candidates representing different parties and I was the Labour candidate. I had to run a campaign and tell the people of Plymouth what I would do for them if they elected me. The people voted and they voted for me! That means I am elected for 5 years or until another election is called.

Kacper - How long have you been an MP?

I stood for election in 2015 but I wasn't elected. So then I tried again, because that's what we need to do if we don't succeed the first time - we need to keep trying. So when I stood for election in 2017, I did a better job and I was elected. And, I am a better MP now, 4 years later, than I was on my first day because the longer we do a job, the better



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we get! In Plymouth, the election is always very close between the Red party and the Blue party so we always have to work very hard to be elected.

Stewart - What inspired you to become an MP?

My mum! She always told me that if I see something that's not right, I have a choice. I could think to myself "They should do something about that" (meaning the government or the council or somebody else); or I could say, "I need to do something about that". That's how we change things for the better and make things right.

Stewart - What have been your greatest achievements since becoming an MP?

I have brought about several changes to laws but my greatest achievement, the thing that makes me most proud is my proposal to make Plymouth Sound into a National Marine Park. We have National Parks like Dartmoor and other great places but I think it doesn't have to be just the land. We need to take care of our oceans and sea life and now Plymouth Sound is the first National Marine Park in England.

Joy - What are you currently working on?

Oh, that's a tricky question! At the moment I am working to get more money for Plymouth. We are also working to improve the trainline and I am trying to get more trees planted - especially on busy roads so that we can make the air cleaner and make the people of Plymouth healthier. I like to keep busy and you might see me on the News sometimes.

Sam - What are the biggest challenges you face as an MP?

My biggest challenge is to win the election campaign and stay elected so that I can continue to work hard for the people of Plymouth and the city of Plymouth. Sometimes Plymouth is ignored by the other members of Parliament in London because we are so far from London. I need to keep reminding them about Plymouth and about what Plymouth people need. I want to make sure Plymouth gets its fair share - money, jobs, housing, transport and support to improve the environment. In some other parts of the country, schools get more money for each child than we get for our children in Plymouth and that isn't fair on our schools or on our children.

Stewart - We were elected yesterday! What advice can you give to us in our new roles?

1. Work as a team; work together as a team but also work with other children and with your teachers to make changes happen. You can't do it all by yourself!
2. Remember what you promised; things will get very busy with lots of jobs to do and sometimes we forget what we set out to do so we need to keep reminding ourselves of our promises.
3. Enjoy your role - I look forward to seeing you campaign in Plymouth when you are older!

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COVID19 Information

As Lateral Flow Testing continues in schools and homes, could we remind you to report any positive results to covid@holycross.plymouth.sch.uk or to **ring the school office immediately**, with self-isolation taking place until a confirmatory PCR test result is received. If the PCR comes back negative, your child can return to school. If the PCR is positive, your child will need to isolate for the full ten days from the onset of symptoms or the date of the test is asymptomatic. Any positive PCR tests should also be shared with us along with the date of the positive test.

The guidance has now changed.

If a child or member of staff tests positive, NHS track and Trace will carry out contact tracing.

Close contacts will be contacted by NHS Track and Trace and advised appropriately.

If there is a positive case in school, we will inform the parents of the affected class **but** we will not do contact tracing or send whole classes home.

If not contacted by NHS Track and Trace, you can assume that your child has not been identified by them as a close contact.

However, we all know how closely children interact within the classroom so we would advise you to book a PCR test for your child when informed of a positive case in their class. They can continue to attend school whilst waiting for either the test or the result. If the PCR is positive, then they should isolate.

We would also advise you to be vigilant and to monitor your child for symptoms if informed of a positive case within their class. They should not attend school if they develop symptoms and should book a PCR test immediately.

You should not take a **Lateral Flow Device** (LFD) test if you are symptomatic even if LFD testing is part of your routine. **LFD tests are for people who are asymptomatic** – i.e. not showing any symptoms. If you are not sure whether you have one or more of the symptoms then book a **PCR** test.

Please note that this applies to anyone in your household as well.

If your child presents with a new continuous cough, a fever or is experiencing any loss of or change in their taste/smell, please do not send them to school.

If your child presents with any of these symptoms while at school, we will call you immediately. You should have your child tested and the whole household should self-isolate until you get the result. Further action will depend on the result of the test.
