
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SAFER JOURNEYS TO SCHOOL

As you know, we have noticed a number of parents and carers parking on the double yellow lines opposite the school gate and on private parking bays on Whitefriars Lane every school day at drop-off and pick-up times.

In an effort to encourage drivers to park elsewhere, we are running a road safety campaign in May and June called *Safer Journeys To School*.



Designed and supported by the **Road Safety Team at Plymouth City Council**, the campaign invites driving parents to:

- Find out where they can park easily, safely and for free within a 400 metre distance from the school gate.
- Make use of a free parking permit kindly approved by the Parking team on Hampton Street and part of Constantine Street only, and walk the rest of the journey to school.
- Consider including walking as part of the school journey even if the car is needed for some of it.
- Appreciate the many benefits of walking on themselves and their children.

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• Consider trying different ways of travelling to and from school occasionally without relying on the car.

The campaign is also an opportunity to remind all parents, and not only drivers, of the importance of helping their children to be safer on their journey to school when scooting, cycling but particularly walking by the road side and crossing the road. Finding the safest place to cross and using the Green Cross Code are important skills that children need to learn from an early age. 

KS2 SATS

The Key Stage 2 Statutory Assessment Tests for all **Year 6 children** across the UK, will take place from Monday 9th May to Thursday 12th May inclusive. Below is the timetable of the tests the majority of which will take place between 9.30 and 11am each day. All tests, when there are two in one day, will be completed by lunchtime.

<u>Please ensure your child is in</u> <u>school each day.</u>



A breakfast bap will be provided to those arriving early - please see the letter sent home by the Year 6 team regarding this.

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When are Year 6 SATs 2022?

Tuesday 28 th June	Deadline for teacher assessment
July	SATs results returned to school and released to parents.

How long do the tests take?

What are the Year 6 SATs used for?

The results of the tests and the teacher assessments will be passed onto the school that the child is attending in Year 7. How these schools use the results vary, but they are often used to set or stream children for English and maths (and possibly other subjects). However, many primary schools have robust transition arrangements which include detailed discussions with Year 7 tutors about individual children. If, for example, a child did not perform to the best of their ability during the tests, this information will often be passed on. Schools and Local Authorities will also use the data to judge the effectiveness of the education within the setting. The government additionally publishes league tables which rank schools according to the percentage of pupils that achieve the expected standard in English and maths.

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Jess Rowe will be coming to Holy Cross on Wednesday 4th May to lead KS2 pupils and staff in a singing assembly! We hope the children will be inspired to perhaps join the **MANGO TANGO** choir.

The Uniform Store Plymouth is a free service for families to kit out their children for school. Through donations of good quality school uniforms, we give these items out to those in need, free of charge – no referral is needed.



We run a pop-up shop in Plymouth City Centre

throughout the school summer holidays, and a Click and Collect service that runs throughout the year, where parents/carers can order the uniform that they need for their children and collect it from our collection point. Our collection point is at Redeemer Church, St Barnabas Terrace, Plymouth PL1 5NN.



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COVID19 Information from 1st April 2022

Specific Guidance for Schools regarding COVID 19 has now been withdrawn. Guidance has now been issued by UKSHA for Respiratory infections, including coronavirus (COVID-19)



Guidance for children in educational settings included in People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID-19 - GOV.UK (<u>www.gov.uk</u>)

Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and where possible avoid contact with other people. They can go back to an education or childcare setting when they no longer have a high temperature and they are well enough.

It is not recommended that children and young people are tested for COVID-19 unless directed to do so by a health professional.

If a child or young person has a positive COVID-19 test result they should try to stay at home and where possible avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day, they took the test.

Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days.

Children and young people who usually go to school, college or childcare and who live with someone who has a positive COVID-19 test result should continue to attend as normal.

Children with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, or mild cough, who are otherwise well, can continue to attend their education or childcare setting.

We will continue to highlight the importance of handwashing, good respiratory hygiene, ventilation and a robust cleaning regime in order to limit transmission in school.
